History

The Putnam County Community Foundation is a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit public charity established in 1985 to administer endowments in perpetuity, award grants, and provide leadership, enriching the quality of life and strengthening community in Putnam County, Indiana. The Community Foundation administers more than 340 funds and endowments supporting a variety of charitable activities and has awarded more than \$19 million dollars in grants and scholarships since inception.

Mission Statement

The Putnam County Community Foundation partners with those who give to enrich the quality of life and strengthen community for this and future generations.

Financial Accountability

The Foundation's total endowment, valued at more than \$43.5 million, is a family of charitable funds established by donors. The endowment is permanent; granting dollars are produced by earnings and market growth. We are good stewards of our endowment; we keep our fees as low as possible and receive professional investment advice from Mason Investment Advisory Services. As a result, our investment returns are higher than average for an endowment of our size.

A LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP



Dear Foundation Family,

For nearly 37 years, the Putnam County Community Foundation has had the privilege to work alongside our donors, board members, volunteers, and community partners to build a great community for this and future generations.

Although many look back at 2021 and note the things they couldn't do, here at the Community Foundation, we look back at the last year and see philanthropy at work in our communities.

Last year, we worked with 15 donors to establish new funds aligned with their philanthropic ambitions. We are proud to assist individuals, families, and businesses fulfill their charitable goals by establishing endowed funds with the Community Foundation.

Your Community Foundation worked to address many of the issues currently facing our communities. We awarded 43 grants, totaling more than \$200,000, to our nonprofit and charitable initiatives working directly to provide vital services our community members need.

In addition, we awarded scholarships to 51 local students who are furthering their education and pursuing their dreams. The Community Foundation is proud to administer over 65 scholarship programs. Each scholarship was established by an individual, family, or organization with a desire to assist high school students and adult learners continue their education.

We utilized the Putnam County Relief Fund to respond to the emerging and long-term needs created by COVID-19 and quickly deploy resources to local nonprofits, agencies, and charitable entities as they identified funding needs to service those directly impacted. The Relief Fund awarded 15 grants to our community partners in 2021.

The Community Foundation awarded its largest ever single grant to the Greencastle/Putnam County YMCA in December. As we continue our work to enrich the quality of life and strengthen community, this grant will do both for Putnam County. The YMCA will bring additional programming for youth, fitness opportunities, athletic facilities, and new community spaces for our community members and nonprofits.

As we continued to see issues arise in workforce development, the Community Foundation partnered with the Ivy Tech Foundation to meet those needs with a \$100,000 grant. The grant will be disbursed to specific areas identified to benefit the Ivy Tech Greencastle campus and our local students furthering their education here in Putnam County.

We are so thankful for you, because it's your support that makes the stories highlighted in our 2021 Annual Report possible. We are honored to be your philanthropic partner, and together, we are building a better tomorrow.

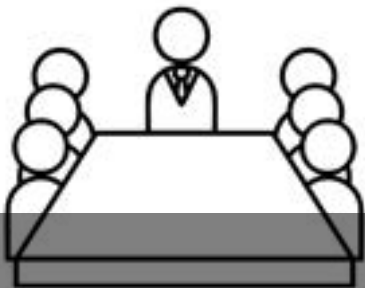

WAYS TO GIVE

Every day the Putnam County Community Foundation helps people turn their philanthropic goals into reality. The Community Foundation helps donors make a difference in our communities both now and in the future. Flexible options, tax-advantaged strategies, and sophisticated gift instruments allow seasoned philanthropists and new donors alike to create positive and lasting impact.

In-depth knowledge of the local community, philanthropic information, and accessible support are just a few of the professional services you receive when you give through the Community Foundation. You may choose to stay involved as a fund advisor or tell us your unique vision and leave the grantmaking to us.

Gift Options

Cash. Options include cash, checks, money orders, and secure credit card donations through our website. Automatic withdrawal and wire transfers can also be arranged.

Stocks, Bonds, and Mutual Funds. When held for one year or more, a charitable deduction is provided for the full market value of the donated asset, even if you bought it for less, and helps reduce capital gains tax.

Retirement Accounts. Name the Community Foundation as full, partial or contingent beneficiary of your retirement assets and keep those assets working in our community. During your lifetime, giving your IRA's required minimum distribution (RMD) helps reduce taxable income.

Life Insurance. Name the Community Foundation as a full, partial, or contingent beneficiary or transfer ownership and receive an immediate tax deduction for the policy's cash value. Any future premiums paid would also qualify for a deduction.

Real Estate. Turn a home, business, or land into a charitable gift outright, or set up a trust that will convert the property into a gift that provides you with income, a tax deduction, and avoidance of capital gains taxes.

Gifts through a will or trust. Support your favorite charity through the Community Foundation in the future after your debts and obligations are fulfilled and you no longer have a need for your assets.

Gifts of Grain. By giving grain to the Community Foundation, you avoid including the sale of the grain in your farm income. Gifts of grain can be easily made at the same time you are selling grain at your local grain elevator.

Corporate Matches. Ask your employer if they match donations to charities. It may be possible to double the impact of your contributions.

Charitable Gift Annuities. Giving through an annuity allows you to arrange a generous gift, while providing a new income source you can count on for the rest of your life.

Types of Funds

Named Funds for the Common Good (Unrestricted Endowments): Benefit from the expertise of staff, diverse members of the community, and our Board of Directors to deploy grant funding where it can best meet current needs and aspirations in Putnam County.

Field-of-Interest Endowments: You decide the fund's focus area, and the Community Foundation awards grants to high-performing organizations and programs in your selected field.

Endowments for Nonprofits, Churches and Units of Government: Created with a nonprofit's own assets, these endowments can sustain programs, save for a major project, or provide the organization with a safety net.

Designated Endowments: Provide a reliable annual income stream to one or more of your favorite charitable organizations or programs forever.

Donor-Advised Endowments: An excellent, lower-cost, hassle-free alternative to a private foundation. Support multiple organizations and programs throughout the year, with our staff helping to identify grant recipients, ensure their charitable status, and provide grantmaking and administrative support.

Collaborative Endowments: A group contributes to a single fund with grants recommended by the group or a representative committee toward a common purpose or project.

Fiscal Sponsorship Endowments: Cemeteries and other groups or organizations that are not 501(c)3 public charities benefit from tax deductible donations through the Community Foundation. The Community Foundation ensures that grants support charitable activities.

Scholarship Endowments: Financially support students who are selected in accordance with criteria designated by the donors such as high school, college, merit, need, or field of study. Services are customized to suit your desired level of involvement.

Named Funds for the Community Foundation: Support the Community Foundation's programs and services in general or choose a particular program for support.

Collective Giving

Not yet ready to create your own fund? Donate any amount to any of the over 340 funds and endowments administered by the Community Foundation. These funds were created by your friends, neighbors, and school mates from Putnam County and support all types of charitable organizations and purposes. When joined with the donations of others, the impact of your gift is leveraged in a big way. Consider honoring or memorializing a special person with your donation, and the Community Foundation will provide notice of your gift (without the amount) if you desire.

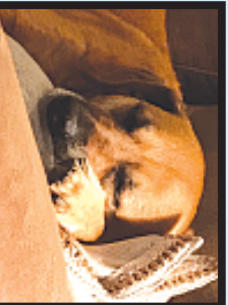
